Stephen John George Fabos

5'7"/5'6", Hazel-brown eyes; brown hair. Blood type: B- or B+ Served in World War II, USMC, 5th Division Amphibious Corps, Service Battalions (SeaBees), Signal Corp: Radar and Radio technician/specialist, photographer, rank of Corporal Enlisted 5 May, 1943; honorably discharged 22 Feb. 1946; Service Record. No. (File No.) 853593 (classified for some years during and after service). Served at Iwo Jima, Kwajaliein, Saipan and Okinawa. Prisoner of War on Okinawa. Wounded twice; once on Saipan. Had PTSD for the rest of his life and anger management problems, which caused difficulties at times with his children, especially his son. He and his son grew even more apart when he married a second time, for unclear reasons. After service continued education with about 1 yr. at U OF PAC. Not sure whether this was in Hawaii after recovery from Okinawa, or in Stockton, more likely the former. He owned a home, briefly in Honolulu on the Island of Oahu.

John grew up in the east side of Toledo, OH, in what was called by the KKK and others "Hunkytown," but more officially "the Birmingham neighborhood" after Birmingham, England. The Hungarian emigrants at the turn of the last century took over and remodeled what had once been mostly company houses for an old clay quarry and brick-making factory, and then added other new houses, a shopping district, church and

school, all Hungarian in character. Because the widest part of the Maumee River and no major road bridge separated this area from the main part of Toledo, for several decades, it developed and retained a separate life, and could almost be thought of as another little bit of the old country. It was a few miles south of pleasant beaches along Lake Erie that reminded many of the original Hungarian settlers of Lake Balaton near where most had lived in Hungary. John lived in a household that had at one point, his parents, a friend and sometimes 'bodyguard" for his father, Stephen Simon, affectionately called "Simonbachi" (Uncle Simon) his older brother Emery, and older sister Aranka, and three adopted sisters who were actually cousins of both his parents but whose mother had died soon after childbirth with the last, Irene, Barbara, and Mary Nyers.

John almost didn't make it to his third birthday when one fine summer Sunday, the KKK thought they'd like to terrorize the Hungarian neighborhood on the east side of Toledo where his family lived. They rode through the quiet streets as the families were sitting down to Sunday dinner shooting into many houses and tossing gasoline bombs into some. His adopted sister/cousin Irene had him on her lap and had just bent to tuck a napking into his little collar when a bullet passed through her hairline, leaving a permanent part, besides stunning her for a moment. Grandfather ran for his gun, while grandmother and Irene's sisters tended to her and the now crying younger children. The gunmen got away that time, but made the mistake of retuning one more time. This time the neighborhood was ready and waiting, guns cocked. I was told at least two KKK were killed, and several wounded and what existed of the police department on that side of the Maumee River called for a truce to escort the surviving KKK out, with their casualties. The KKK never returned after that. I guess they didn't realize how many Hungarian Huszars who were crack shots--even from horseback, lived in the neighborhood and how much prior experience they'd had dealing with Serbian and Croatian radiers who still existed in the late 1800's. The Serbians still tried to take people from Hungary to sell to the Turks as slaves, so nearly everyone from the southern counties knew how to use weapons well. John's father began teaching him to use a bow and a gun before he was out of grade school and they went bow hunting sometimes for extra meat for the family during the Depression. The family also had about 2 acres within the city limits that held a house and gardens, including a small orchard and berry patches. By the time my father was in grade school, the house had been remodeled twice and was a longish-rambling affair with a full bathroom, grandmother's pride and joy, off the kitchen with a tub with iron, lion's paw feet big enough for her husband to recline soaking or to wash two or three rambunctious children in at a time. There was both a front parlor and formal dining room with two bedrooms off those, and behind the large kitchen was another family room for sewing and cards, and such, and another bedroom off that. A second half floor had been added with a large dormer where three children slept. It also had a covered front porch. It was about twice the size of most of the former quarry and brick workers' homes, even after most of those had been added to as well, but it looked like an expanded workers' home, nonethless. A mansion it was not, but from the early 1920's to the 1980's, it never had fewer than 5 people living in it, and often 8 or 9, even with just one bathroom. Behind the house was a small barn with two horses and a milk cow, besides the wagon, and sometimes a calf The cellar was where the family escaped from summer's heat and had a main room for dining and entertainment that was also partly store-room and laundry room. A second room was John's father's workshop where he made harnesses and other leather goods and mended and made shoes, and did wood work, when he wasn't working outside or in the barn on wood. He had complete sets of wood-working and leather working tools--almsot all hand tools, at the time. Electricity had been brought to the homes but was not in as widely used for so many things then. John's mother's electric wringer washer, for example, was one of the first in the neighborhood and a local marvel for some time. The same was true for the first refrigerator. John's father believed in providing well for his family, especially the necessities and anything that made his wife's life easier. He also worked outside the home and gardens, as if that wasn't a busy enough life. Most people did in those days. He was a fireman, then later worked for some years as a foreman at the Textile Leather Company. There was also a chicken coop and grape arbors between the house and the barn and a smoke house, next to the barn. The family made their own wines and smoked hams and sausage as well as canning vegetables, fruits, jams and jellies and such to feed themselves throughout the yea, and had feather filled pillows and comforters to keep them warm in winter, along with all the quilts the women made out of scraps of material left over from clothes-making, and flour sacks. They were not quite as fine as the goose down as John's parents had grown up with on the family estates in Hungary, but better than what many people had in many U.S. cities at the time.. The family also had the only greenhouse in that part of Toledo for fresh vegetables, including tomatoes all winter long. An uncle of his mother, Stephen Nyers (his mother's mother was a Nyers) had moved to Ohio and settled on a farm, with help from John's father. There was additional livestock and grain raised on the farm and John and his sister sometimes went to the farm to help with the farmwork, and John with the butchering in the late summer and fall. Emery, the oldest son, did his turn at this before

John, but Emery went to school in Europe, in Rome, to become a priest, during his teenage years, leaving only Aranka, John, and their adopted sisters. Soon, Barbara was gone also, to become a nun. The family was very religious and helped raise funds to build the local Church, St. Sephen's Catholic Church and decorate it with many fine items from Europe. The Church was fine enough to be a basilica in many areas, and had a Monsignor attached to it, who had known the family back in Hungary, and who had once tutored Archduke Karl. He tutored John and Emery, also, and helped Emery prepare for the Seminary and University in Rome. John and Emery's parents had once been aristrocrats in Hungary, and John's father, Stephen Michael (called Michael) was a leader in the Hungarian community in Toledo and respected by the community and the Church. John could have gone to any college in the world, but hated desk work, and much indoor work, but loved building things, So he chose, and graduated from, Toledo Polytechnical Institute before enlisting in the USMC, after World War II broke out. Toledo Poly was a technical school that replaced H.S. and Jr. College prior to WWII. John's older brother, Emery, despite having gone through the lower and uper divisions of seminary education and three years at theology and additional studies at the University of Rome, never became a priest. He decided to get married instead and worked as an industrial relations specialist, and in some other civil service capacities. His wife, Anna, developed a shop specializing in religious ritual garments (Communion dresses, confirmation robes and caps) and articles, and later added formal gowns for young ladies, such as for senior proms and weddings.

John met his first wife, Wilma Maie Wallace-Mitchell (she had been married less than a month and divorced her first husband when he hit her one evening) in Honolulu, Oahu, Hawaii, just before the end of World War II. He was recovering from his experiences on Okinawa and working in the radio and radar construction and repair facilities at Pearl Harbor and she was in supplies and the intelligence division of the Pacific Command, where she had recently been transferred at the end of her marriage. She was in the US Navy,a yeoman 2nd class (petty officer) under Stillwell. When the war ended, she'd just passed her exams for and been made yeoman 1st class, but it was not actually effective yet, and she had just taken exams for OCS, and passed. She gave up a budding military career to marry John and loved him very much. Her military records were still classified until after her death in 1987. She was discharged in 1946 near Oakland, California and they were marrried, March 24, 1947 in a civil ceremony in San Francisco and celebrated with friends, at the "Top of the Mark" (the restaurant at the top of the famed Mark Hilton Hotel, that evening. The Catholic Church investigated and annulled her first marriage, and she took the prescribed catechism for adults classes eventually--she had reservations about the Catholic Church--and John and Wilma were married a second time in the Catholic Church, in the fall of 1956, after the birth of their last child, and only surviving son, Stephen Michael. She was confirmed and married on the same day their son was baptized. Their three daughters were not permitted to be at these combined Church cemermonies, but their first cousins by John's sister, Aranka, were, even though all were close in age. The reason was, that in the official eyes of the Church at that time, the three older daughters were all illegitimate until the marriage was performed. Fortunately not all parts of the Catholic Church, even in Ohio, were quite so strict in the status granted children of at least a civil marriage and the oldest was already enrolled in St. Clement's Catholic School, in the non-Hungairian suburb (former small independent town) of Trilby (next to swanky, secular Sylvania), and all three daughters had been baptized by and within various Catholic Churches in California and Ohio.

John was an electrician after WWII and a licensed aviator (though he never owned a plane). He rose to rank of Foreman/General Foreman and supervised up to 6 job sites and 150 men at a time for Schwartz and Lindheim Co., out of Oakland, CA. Before moving to and working in northern California, he worked for Schlumberger in reconstruction for a year in Okinawa (1947-1948) then worked on projects in Kodiak and Adak in the Aleutian Islands, Alaska, for this company. He on the construction crews that built the U.S. Navy/Submarine base at Adak. He then worked on building and running a power plant in Labrador. He guit the international projects when his wife, Wilma, nearly died delivering their third child, Elizabeth Nannette, since she suffered both after the birth of their second child, Catherine Ann, and the third child and was guite fatigued for months after both. By that time, she had contracted hypothyroidism, and then 9 months after the birth of Nannette, suffered a miscarriage in a car accident when they on their way to a vacation in Michigan. A baby boy was lost as a result of that accident. Wilma was between 5 and 6 months pregnant at the time. This was about August, 1955. He then worked mostly in assignments from his Ohio union for the glass companies, helping to build new plants, remodel and upgrade older ones for Libby Owens Ford, Libbey Glass, Fostoria, Imperial and others, in and around Toledo. A husband of a niece (his oldest brother was 18 years older than he was, so his nieces were more like cousins) worked for Imperial Glass, at one time, so the glass industry was important to the families. Ohio, at that time, was a major producer of all kinds of glass for tableware, decor and industry, including the auto industry. He

moved to northern California with his fist wife, Wilma, in 1959. At one time he and she considered going into the resort business with her sister Flora and Flora's husband, James Keeline, so they spent a summer in Lake County, California working for/with the Keelines. That idea didn't work out, but he liked northern California and the opportunities with the then booming post-war construction industry, and Wilma was determined not to return to Ohio where she had not gotten along with her mother-in-law and sister-in-law and had a nervous breakdown from her situation there. John loved his wife, Wima, very mcuh and they had four children toghether, whom he also loved. He decided she had good reasoning and the family resttled in San Mateco, California, and in 1965 moved to San Jose, California where John and Wilma resided until Wilma died in November, 1987. John was also a member of IBEW 617 in either Alameda, or San Mateo County from 1959 to retirement in 1986.

With his wife, and oldest daughter, Cecilia Linda Lee, he had a long-time hobby of rock and mineral collecting and learned to make cabochon jewelry and to facet stones. He was credited by the California Bureau of Mines with several important discoveries of new mineral localities. He had a nationally noted crystalline mineral collection that was partly donated to the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco, the Los Gatos, California Museum, the California Mineralogical Museum originally in San Francisco but later moved to Mariposa, CA, and at least two items were requested by and sent to the Smithsonian Museum in Washington, DC. He was President of the Santa Clara Valley Gem and Mineral Society for some years in the 1970's, and field trip director for both this organization and the San Mateo County Gem and Mineral Society. He and his wife also had a hobby-business for a few years, selling and trading rocks and minerals, called "Las Piedras." They had hoped to retire eventually with this business but that did not work out. The older daughters, mostly had jobs in the business, helping to sell items at gem and mineral shows and swap meets and by mail, and doing the packaging. The oldest daughter helped to set up and tear down the display tables as well, and worked on the business paper work and taxes with her mother, Wilma, for the business. Pay was essentially in occasional pieces of jewelry for the two girls, and an occasional mineral for the oldest as well, and a few dollars occasionally for a special occasion. The money generally went for vacations and into savings for John and Wilma's retirement and special projects--like painting the house when it got to be too much for John. He'd broken his back in 1961, not at work, but lifting heavy rocks to build a waterfall and pond in the back garden in San Mateo, and it never fully healed. After that, the doctors wouldn't hear of him climbing on ladders to paint, especially not the two story home they bought in San Jose. His back finally fused together which lessened pain and the need for a brace, but stairs became more painful to climb, and after three of the children had left home (the daughters), they did not need the two story house with five bedrooms. So they bought a very nice one-story ranch style home right as the hills began to rise on the east side of San Jose next to the north end of Alum Rock Park, on Dorel Drive. It turned out to have as much square footage as the two-story, especially when John and Wilma decided to add on to the master bedroom and build a new, large, spa type bathroom for it, but there were fewer and more spacious rooms. With the children, their spouses, and grandchildren at the holidays, and the entertaining they liked to do with long-time friends, the spaciousness was well-used. They also acquired a condominium in Spain at Ben-al-Madena Costa, on the Costa del Sol, west of Torremolinos and Malaga. All was looking rosy as his wife retired from working for the City of San Jose, for a couple of years, when Wilma collapsed at a Schwartz and Lindheim picnic with what seemed to be pneumonia, in June, 1986. It turned out to be cancer instead. The beautiful home next to the park and the sunny relaxed condominitium in Spain were never guite home again after his first wife, Wilma Maie Wallace-Fabos died in November, 1987, of cancer, He began to travel and stay away from his home more and more. Both the home in San Jose and the condominium in Spain were sold within months of his second marriage.

He married again in August, 1990, a widow named Betty Ann (Miller) Gozcar of Sarasota, Florida (she was originally from Pontiac, Michigan), and moved to Sarasota, Florida where his last residence was. He had met her when he went there on a fishing trip. He was very happy with Betty and traveled all over the world with her, and enjoyed sport fishing in the Gulf of Mexico and along the Atlantic coast for most of his second marriage. He suffered two cases of pneumonia in the last years of his life, one after a 30 day trip to China during which "they never saw the sun, because it was so smoggy." He told his children the doctor told him the smog was so bad it had burned his lungs, which largely caused the pneumonia. Then in 2004 he was on a crusie of the Pacrific and Indian Ocean and came down with another case of pneumonia so bad, he had to be flown home from the shiip, first to Singapoore, then to Florida. This was in December, 2004. A few days after he'd been flown home, the Great Indonesian earthquake and tsunami struck. They just missed experiencing that. He was told there was still a spot on his lungs that puzzled the VA doctors, when he had mostly recovered. By April, 2005 he had recovered enough the doctors allowed him to plan a

cross-Canada railroad trip. He took ill again, what was his final illness, about 2/3 of the way through the trip, after crossing the Rocky Mountains near Winnipeg and had to be taken to Michigan for diagnosis and treatment. He was found to have both lungs nearly filled with pulmonary fibrosis and given less than 2 weeks prognosis and died at that hospital, in Royal Oak, Michigan, near where Betty's son and her grandchildren lived. His remains were cremated at Meadowcrest Memorial Cemetery and Crematorium, 5800 E. Davidson, Detroit, MI, and laid to rest at the Golden Gate National Cemetery, in South San Francisco/San Bruno, CA, (for veterans and spouses) next to hiis first wife, on the hill a few rows below the flag.
